



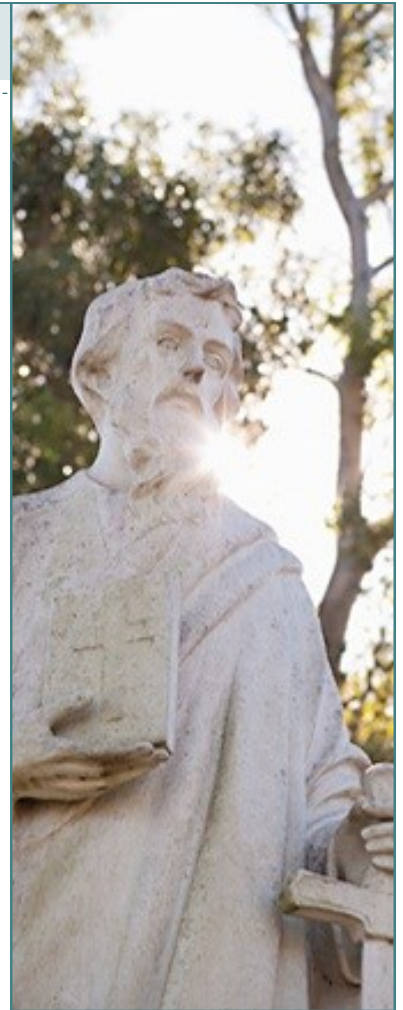

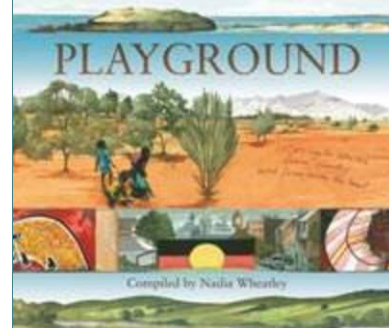

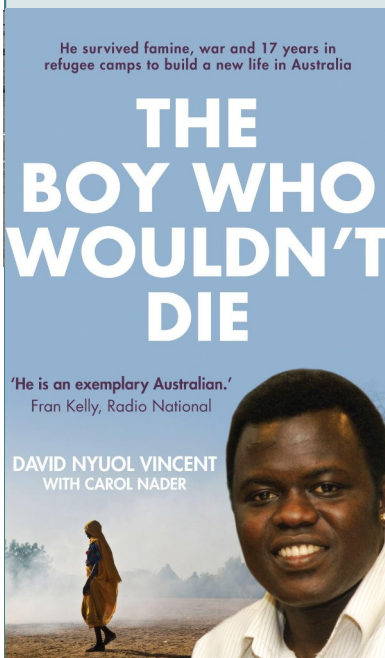

Good Muslim Boy by Osamah Sami

Good Muslim Boy is Osamah Sami's true depiction of his life as a young Muslim man. From his early life with his family in Iran during the Iran/Iraq war, to their migration to Australia, his tale is in turns comic and tragic, and explores the universal truths of growing up, falling in love and marriage, family and following one's dream.

A double shot of happiness : Tim Sharp's extraordinary journey from being diagnosed with autism to becoming an internationally renowned artist by Judy Sharp

At three years of age, Tim was diagnosed with autism so severe that his mother was told he would never be able to talk or learn or live in a normal household. Twenty years later, Tim's joyful artworks and drawings involving his super hero, Laser Beak Man, have been exhibited around the world. This is his mother's account of Tim's odyssey from that terrible diagnosis to his emergence as an acclaimed artist and a fulfilled, loving and loved young man.

A place for us : a Greek immigrant boy's odyssey to a new country and an unknown father by Nicholas Gage

Nicholas Gage tells the moving story of travelling by ship from Greece, meeting his father and growing up in Worcester, Massachusetts.

The boy who wouldn't die by David Nyuol Vincent

David Nyuol Vincent was a little boy when he fled southern Sudan with his father, as war raged in their country. He left behind his distraught mother and sisters, his village and his childhood. They survived the perilous Sahara Desert crossing into Ethiopia only to be separated. David was taken in and trained as a child soldier, surviving the next 17 years of his life alone in refugee camps. Life was a relentless struggle against starvation, air bombings and people determined to kill him and his people. In 2004 David was offered a humanitarian visa as one of the Lost Boys of Sudan and was resettled to Australia. This is the powerful account of a young man's resilience.

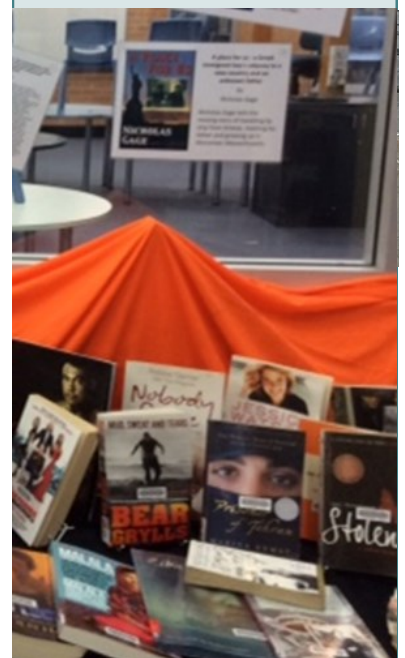
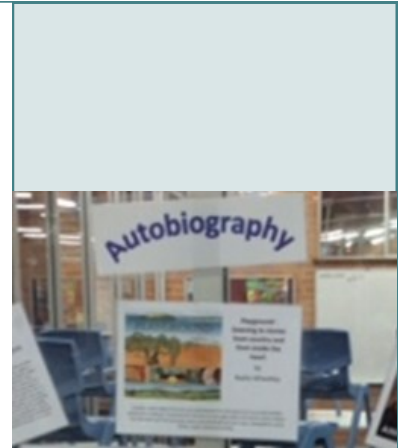

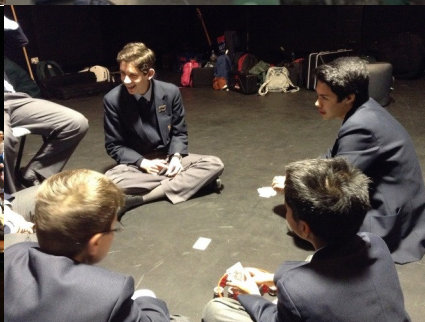

YEAR 11 ELEVATE EDUCATION WORKSHOP

The recent Elevate ‘Ace Your Exams’ seminar placed a strong emphasis on consistent study sequences from week to week as a method of reducing stress and a means for achieving examination goals. The instructors were HSC graduates who are currently completing university degrees

which not only assisted us in being able to converse with them with greater familiarity but also share ideas from them which were relevant due to them having recently completed their high school experience.

The seminar involved working through and completing a booklet that delved into student's individual goal setting and identifying common examination preparation mistakes as well as discussing issues on a broader spectrum.
